As of December 23, 2021, all beekeepers in NYS are required to register with Ag and Markets and renew their registration annually regardless of whether you are selling nucleus colonies or queens or not. New Remote Sensing Research for Water Chestnut in Erie Canal

Drone remote sensing is rapidly becoming a useful tool for collecting data and monitoring changes of geographic features with high spatial and temporal resolutions. Nonnative Tree Population Increase - USDA Forest Service Report

Nonnative tree species, while generally viewed as detriments to ecosystems, may provide important ecosystem services, such as carbon storage. A recent <u>USDA Forest Service Report</u> documents an increase in nonnative tree species in forests in the conterminous U.S. and on Pacific and Caribbean islands. The report can aid managers in assessing the impacts of nonnative trees and human interference on forest composition.

Managing Great Lakes Invaders - Video Series

The <u>five-part short video series</u>, Managing Great Lakes Invaders, was developed by Michigan Sea Grant and the Great Lakes Aquatic Nonindigenous Species Information System (GLANSIS). Each short video focuses on a different Great Lakes invasion story, including ballast water, sea lamprey, dreissenid mussels, and invasive carp, along with a capstone video that unites them. This project demonstrates how cooperation between researchers, legislators, industry, and other stakeholders can make a powerful difference in protecting the Great Lakes.

2022 Online Exams for Licensed Guides Announced

Examinations are scheduled for individuals seeking to become licensed guides in New York State for camping; fishing; hiking; hunting; whitewater; rock climbing; ice climbing; and certified skilled with boats and canoes. A guide is a person at least 18 years of age who offers services for hire, part or all of which include directing, instructing, or aiding another individual in fishing, hunting, camping, hiking, whitewater rafting/canoeing/kayaking, or rock and ice climbing. Applicants need not be a resident of New York State to receive a guide's license. Exams in 2022 will be online. The registration deadline for exams is seven days before the examination. 'Greater Niagara' Birding Trail Includes 36 Locations in Five Western New York Counties

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced the opening of the Greater Niagara segment of the New York State Birding Trail. The Greater Niagara segment includes 36 locations throughout Erie, Genesee, Niagara, Orleans, and Wyoming counties, providing a variety of quality birding experiences for New Yorkers and visitors to enjoy. Birdwatching has quickly become one of New York's fastest-growing recreation and tourism activities. The statewide trail includes a network of promoted birding locations that can be accessed by car or public transportation, providing an inclusive experience for all visitors to enjoy birds amid beautiful natural settings with little or no cost or investment in equipment. The diversity of trail locations makes it so that everyone from Downtown Buffalo to the Lake Ontario shoreline to rural Wyoming county can easily find a great birding location nearest to them! The New York State Birding Trail map is available at the New York State Birding webpage and provides valuable information on each site such as location, available amenities, species likely to be seen, directions, and more. Additional information on birding, educational and interpretive information, is also available. Digital information on the Birding Trail will be updated periodically, so budding outdoor enthusiasts are encouraged to check back often.

Scallop Response to LED Lights Helps Reduce Harvesting Damage

With experimentation to replace fish with LED lights as bait for crab and lobster pots, scientists found that their lights attracted scallops. Normally these mollusks are removed by dredging the bottom of the habitat, causing significant damage. This research may lead to traps which collect the scallops using these lights. More

Farmland Protection Grants Available

The NYS Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce the availability of funds for the Round 18 Farmland Protection Implementation Grants (FPIG) Program – Conservation Easement Projects. The intent is to fund the implementation of certain farmland protection activities intended to maintain the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry and its supporting land base and to protect the environmental and landscape preservation values associated with agriculture. Grant applications will be accepted on a continuous basis. The RFA will remain open and awards will be made until such time as available funds are fully committed, or the RFA is closed.

Funding for EV Charging Stations

Through Charge Ready NY, NYSERDA provides rebates of \$4,000 per charging port for Level 2 charging stations installed at public, workplace, and multi-unit dwelling parking lots. This could add up to a savings of 30% to 80%, depending on station and installation costs. Additional incentives of \$500 per port may be awarded for installations within disadvantaged communities. Most utilities now offer incentives for installing charging stations that can cover most of the installation costs and can be used in tandem with New York State and federal tax credits.

Make Cigarette Butts Part of Your Cleanups

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. Locally, data from the Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup conducted by Ocean Conservancy indicates that more than 300,000 cigarette butts (35.3% of all items recovered) were collected from the Great Lakes in 2019. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts leach toxic chemicals, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. DEC's Regenerate NY program provides cost-share grants to New York landowners looking to enhance forest regeneration on their property. Landowners who want to plant trees, control competing vegetation, restore a degraded forest stand, or exclude deer are encouraged to apply for project funding. It includes: a comprehensive walk through of the facility; site staff interviews; utility bill analysis; fuel neutral, unbiased evaluation of potential low-cost/no-cost and capital improvement energy efficiency upgrades; and a report that outlines potential energy and cost savings opportunities for your facility. New Invasive Species: Map Shows you What to Watch

Making sure the lands and waters you love to hunt and fish stay healthy is one of the best ways we can support wildlife. Invasive species are plants and animals that not only harm our forests and waterways, but they can also harm New York's fish and wildlife. Hunters, anglers, and wildlife watchers like you can be a first line of defense, and there's an easy way for you to know what to look for: DEC's #OnesToWatch interactive map! Click on your region of the map to see the species DEC is tracking in your neck of the woods. Then follow the link for each species to find more detailed information, including info on how to easily report sightings.

New Carbon Capture System

Japanese researchers have developed a new carbon capture system that removes carbon dioxide directly from the atmosphere efficiently. Isophorone diamine (IPDA) in a "liquid-solid phase separation" system was found to remove carbon dioxide at the low concentrations contained in the atmosphere with 99 percent efficiency and the compound is reusable with minimal heating. Liquid-solid phase separation systems offer an elegant solution, where the reaction product is insoluble and comes out of solution as a solid. There is no accumulation of product in the liquid, and the reaction speed does not slow down much. More info

Central Terminal Master Plan: State Funding Awarded

The Central Terminal master planredefines the Buffalo Central Terminal's future as a vibrant local and regional destination supporting economic and social opportunities to the Broadway-Fillmore neighborhood, Buffalo's East Side and the City of Buffalo and Western New York. Gov. Kathy Hochul said that \$61 million will be spent on the grand concourse, the exterior of the tower building and the grounds. More info.

Sustainable Leather Alternative from Fungus

Researchers from the University of Boras in Sweden have created a sustainable leather alternative using the spores of a fungus *Rhizopus delemar*, which have been fed with stale bread. As the fungus fed on the bread, it produced microscopic natural fibers made of chitin and chitosan that accumulated in its cell walls. The suspension of fungal cells was then laid out flat and dried to make a leather-like material. The fungal leather has properties similar to real leather. More

Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

Buffalo has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the "Scrap it" program with six summer locations available for drop-off. Acceptable materials are fruits and vegetable scraps, coffee grounds and filters, egg shells, tea bags and nuts. For more info, visit www.buffalorecycles.org.

Managing Great Lakes Invaders - Video Series

The <u>five-part short video series</u>, Managing Great Lakes Invaders, was developed by Michigan Sea Grant and the Great Lakes Aquatic Nonindigenous Species Information System (GLANSIS). Each short video focuses on a different Great Lakes invasion story, including ballast water, sea lamprey, dreissenid mussels, and invasive carp, along with a capstone video that unites them. This project demonstrates how cooperation between researchers, legislators, industry, and other stakeholders can make a powerful difference in protecting the Great Lakes.

Good Neighbors Compost Starts Subscription Service for Food Scrap Dropoffs

Good Neighbors Compost has locked bins to collect food scraps at 500 Seneca and Buffalo River Landing. Starting May 3, there will also be a bin at Elm Street Bakery in East Aurora. Food scraps can be dropped off and they are picked up each week and taken to Buffalo River Compost. As full list of accepted foods is on her website. When people sign up, they get the code to one of the bins. Business pricing varies depending on the bin size and how often she needs to pick up the waste. To sign up or put a new bin somewhere, people can contact her directly through her website or Instagram.

Global Oceanic Plastic Waste: Reckoning with the U.S. Role

An estimated 8 million metric tons (MMT) of plastic waste enters the world's ocean each year - the equivalent of dumping a garbage truck of plastic waste into the ocean every minute. Plastic waste is now found in almost every marine habitat, from the ocean surface to deep sea sediments to the ocean's vast mid-water region, as well as the Great Lakes. The National Academies of Sciences has published a report that responds to a request in the bipartisan Save Our Seas 2.0 Act for a scientific synthesis of the role of the United States both in contributing to and responding to global ocean plastic waste. 2022 New York Harmful Algal Blooms Notification and Reporting System

DEC has announced the start of the 2022 online Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs) map and reporting system to inform the public about HABs locations in New York. Most algae blooms are harmless. However, exposure to toxins and other substances from certain HABs can make people and animals sick. DEC is asking the public and trained algal bloom samplers to send reports of HABs with photos electronically via a simple, mobile phone-friendly form. After DEC and the Department of Health (DOH) evaluate the reports, they are posted to NYHABS. For more information about HABs, visit DEC's Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs) webpage. Help Track Spotted Lanternfly

Spotted lanternfly (SLF) is an invasive pest from Asia that feeds on a variety of plants including grapes, hops, and maple trees, posing a severe threat to NY forests and agriculture. SLF has been found in several locations in NY but has not yet spread to much of the state. One potential pathway for the spread of SLF is its preferred host plant, tree of heaven (TOH), which is already found in many locations across NY. Learn more about the insect here. We are seeking volunteers like you to look for SLF and TOH in your area. Visit the NY iMapInvasives website to learn about the project, and sign up for a grid square on the map to monitor.

Jet fuel from Paper Industry Waste

Why burn lignin when you could use it to fly an airplane? Research shows lignin-based jet fuel performs better with lower emissions than petro-fuels. The paper industry produces millions of tons of <u>lignin</u> as an unwanted waste product which can be used to make a jet fuel that has higher performance and fuel efficiency with fewer emissions and lower cost than conventional fuel. As airlines try to meet environmental standards, this would offer another bio-based fuel. Source: Zhibin Yang et al. Lignin-based jet fuel and its blending effect with conventional jet fuel. *Fuel*, 2022.

Hemlock Wooly Adelgid Management

Hemlock woolly adelgid (HWA, *Adelges tsugae*) is an aphidlike, soft-bodied insect, almost too small to see with the naked eye. Native to Asia, HWA was first reported in the eastern United States in the 1950s. It has since spread to 20 states and two Canadian provinces. HWA feed on tree sap by inserting their mouthparts at the base of the needles and removing plant fluids. Their feeding causes the needles to turn gray, die, and drop from the tree. Branch dieback progresses from the lower branches to the top of the tree. Severe infestations may bring about premature needle drop, reduced twig growth, dieback, and tree death. Info and resources.

Making the switch to an electric vehicle—and pairing it with an ENERGY STAR certified charger—is not only good for the planet, it could also save you \$1,400/year on fuel and car maintenance. Plus, with rebates and tax credits, you can save even more. Learn about all the benefits today! A study examined the life cycle greenhouse gas emissions from electric cars and combustion engine cars globally. Their analysis showed that only battery electric and hydrogen fuel cell electric vehicles have the potential to achieve the magnitude of life-cycle GHG emissions reductions needed to meet Paris Agreement goals.

Farm Energy Audits

NYSERDA offers free energy audits to identify energy efficiency measures for eligible farms and on-farm producers, including but not limited to: dairies, orchards, greenhouses, vegetables, vineyards, grain dryers, and poultry/egg. In addition, greenhouse facilities can receive a free benchmarking report that describes their energy use intensity and benchmarks their facility against an anonymous aggregate of peer facilities. Farms must be customers of a New York State investor-owned utility and contribute to the System Benefits Charge (SBC). Check your current electricity bills. Farms can request an energy audit or a greenhouse benchmark report through the <u>Agriculture Energy Audit Program</u>.

Understanding Your Carbon Footprint: A How-to Guide for Businesses

What is your carbon footprint? It is a measure of your climate impact. Almost every activity in your day-to-day life causes greenhouse gas emissions. These emissions can be quite obvious, like when you drive a car, or less clear, like those produced to provide a financial service. Deer Damage to Forest Regeneration: Using AVID to Assess the Impacts- 12 to 1pm or 7 to 8pm. Dr. Paul Curtis, Professor, Cornell University. Deer impacts to forest regeneration are widespread across New York State. Landowners need simple and reliable methods to assess browsing damage in forest stands and decide if deer management is warranted. In stands with adequate light, where tree regeneration would be expected, plots with tagged seedlings are established and measured annually to evaluate seedling growth rates by tree species. Our research has shown that if tree seedling height growth is <10% per year, that is an indicator that deer may be inhibiting successful forest regeneration. Tips for the Environment:

Recycle your Paint- With the new Extender Producer Responsibility legislation, you can now have your leftover paint recycled. The list of free dropoff sites is growing, check https://www.paintcare.org/. If you purchase paint, encourage the store to become a dropoff site. House paint, primers, sealers, stains, shellacs and varnishes are accepted. Paint should be in original containers with intact labels that identify the product. The program is funded by a small fee – the PaintCare Fee – on the sale of all new paint in the state. The program will provide for continuous and convenient collection year-round and accept all program products regardless of when they were purchased. No longer will you have to plan to bring unwanted oil-based paints for collection at your local Household Hazardous Waste collection event or dry out unwanted latex paint for household trash pick-up.
