### Buffalo Heritage Carousel Receives Funding from KeyBank

The Buffalo Heritage Carousel project received a \$1.2 million New York state grant in October which required matching funds. KeyBank has matched the grant, and along with other donations brings the project's funding closer to its \$4.8 million dollar goal. The project entails a Canalside installation of a 1924 carousel crafted by Spillman Engineering in North Tonawanda. The carousel will undergo restoration and will use solar power for its operations. A Buffalo-based architectural firm, eco\_logic STUDIO, is designing the building to house the carousel and additional meeting and educational space. ## **Buffalo Green Code Approved**

The Buffalo Green Code, arguably the largest planning initiative ever undertaken by the City of Buffalo, was originally announced by Mayor Brown on Earth Day of 2010. The initiative includes several interrelated planning efforts including the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO). Buffalo's Common Council adopted the Buffalo Green Code UDO, four Brownfield Opportunity Areas, and the Land Use Plan. Since initially receiving these documents in October 2015, the Council has held dozens of meetings, involving well over 1,000 participants, and yielding hundreds of comments from citizens. Mayor Brown will sign the UDO legislation into law on January 3, 2017. The UDO represents the city's first comprehensive zoning rewrite in 63 years and is designed to reinforce the City's walkable, mixed use neighborhoods and strengthen its economic centers. ## **DEC Accepting Applications for Urban Forestry Projects**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is accepting applications to fund urban forestry projects that will enhance landscapes and provide green spaces in urban areas across the state. Grants are available to municipalities, public benefit corporations, public authorities, school districts, soil and water conservation districts, community colleges, not-for-profit organizations, and Indian nations or tribes. Awards range from \$11,000 to \$75,000, depending on municipal population. Tree inventories and community forestry management plans have no match. Tree planting and maintenance projects have a 25 percent match. The Department of Environmental Conservation's Urban Forestry Program will host a webinar on **Jan. 5** at 2 p.m. to educate potential applicants on the grants process and answer questions. ## **Western New York Land Conservancy to Restore the Niagara Gorge**

The Western New York Land Conservancy has just secured almost \$1 Million for the new "Restore the Gorge" project from the Niagara River Greenway Ecological Standing Committee to begin ecological restoration work in one of the most important natural places in the world – the Niagara Gorge. To fortify the gorge and restore its health, over the next three years the Land Conservancy plans to remove invasive plant species and improve wildlife habitat on 43 acres of land in the gorge and rim between the Railroad Bridge and the Discovery Center. Seeds of local grasses and wildflowers will be collected for planting at the grassland site. The Land Conservancy is also looking forward to working with the community to help guide the restoration and enhancement work. The public will have numerous opportunities to provide input on the project in the year ahead.

## **Electronic Waste Assistance Grants for Municipalities**

Applications will be accepted during January 2017 for assistance with electronics waste disposal from any municipality that did not already apply during the October 2016 application period. The 2016/17 State budget included \$3 million from the Environmental Protection Fund to assist municipalities with recent unexpected costs of recycling electronic waste. These grants can reimburse up to 50% of actual expenses incurred during April 1, 2016 to March 31, 2017 for recycling of covered e-waste such as computers, computer peripherals, televisions, small scale servers, and small electronic equipment. ## **DEC Seeks Assistance to Locate Black Bear Dens**

State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) wildlife biologists are seeking the public's help to learn about new black bear dens throughout New York. As part of DEC's ongoing monitoring of black bears in New York, wildlife biologists periodically check on black bears during the winter den season. The bears may be fitted with a radio collar to help biologists track the bears' activities throughout the rest of the year and to relocate dens in subsequent years for monitoring cub production, condition, and survival. Bears may den in a rock crevice, tree cavity, or under heavy brush or fallen trees. Since female bears generally give birth in January or early February, a high-pitched squeal from the cubs may be audible if near a den. New York hikers and hunters typically cover countless miles of wooded terrain each year. DEC urges anyone who finds a bear den to not approach or disturb the den, but simply to note the location and move away from the den site. DEC requests that anyone locating a bear den contact their local DEC Wildlife office with specifics about the den location, including GPS coordinates if possible. ## Riverkeeper Announces “Water Academy”

Buffalo Niagara Riverkeeper’s Water Academy provides an experiential field course that will educate adults about local environmental issues through unique partnerships and service learning. Registration is open for this college-level course designed to introduce the community to environmental issues and proactive solutions currently being implemented in the Niagara River watershed. ## Final Guidance on Consideration of Greenhouse Gas Emissions and the Effects of Climate Change

Under NEPA, Federal agencies are required to consider and disclose the potential effects of their actions and decisions on the environment. In many cases, Federal actions have the potential to contribute to climate change by producing greenhouse gas emissions or alternatively, be affected by many of the impacts of a changing climate, such as rising sea levels, extreme weather, drought and wildfires. A final guidance provides a level of predictability and certainty by outlining how Federal agencies can describe these impacts by quantifying greenhouse gas emissions when conducting NEPA reviews. This increased predictability and certainty will allow decision makers and the public to more fully understand the potential climate impacts of all proposed Federal actions, and in turn, assist agencies in comparing alternatives and considering measures to mitigate the impacts of climate change. <https://www.whitehouse.gov/the-press-office/2016/08/02/fact-sheet>

Researchers at the Eindhoven University of Technology in The Netherlands have found a way to combine a technology that concentrates sunlight, called a luminescent solar concentrator (LSC), with very thin micro channels through which liquid can be pumped. The result is a tiny leaf-shaped generator that focuses sunlight on chemicals flowing through tiny channels at high enough intensity to generate the necessary chemical reactions. This breakthrough could make tiny, on-demand chemical factories possible anywhere in the world. Instead of building large factories to create chemicals in volume and shipping the product, drugs could be made in the location they're needed most. Anyone could feed the right elements into the "leaf", expose it to sunlight and generate the chemical reaction that transforms those substances into the desired drug. ### **EPA Proposes Ban of TCE Under Chemical Reform Law**

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is proposing to ban certain uses of the toxic chemical trichloroethylene (TCE) due to health risks when used as a degreaser and a spot removal agent in dry cleaning. EPA identified serious risks to workers and consumers associated with TCE uses in a 2014 assessment that concluded that the chemical can cause a range of adverse health effects, including cancer, development and neurotoxicological effects, and toxicity to the liver. Comments on the proposed rule must be received 60 days after date of publication in the Federal Register. ### **\$3 Million Available to Municipalities for Zero-Emission Vehicles and Infrastructure**

The Municipal ZEV rebate program will be administered by DEC through the [New York State Grants Gateway](#). Municipalities will be eligible for reimbursement of up \$5,000 per vehicle for purchase or leasing of eligible clean vehicles, and up to \$250,000 per facility for installation of eligible Electric Vehicle Supply Equipment or hydrogen fuel cell infrastructure. DEC will accept applications for rebates on a first-come, first-served basis through March 31, 2017, or until the funds are exhausted. Applications will be evaluated according to the criteria outlined in the Request for Applications found in the Grants Gateway [Grant Opportunity Portal](#).

### **Oak Wilt Detected in Canandaigua**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced today that oak wilt, a tree fungus that causes disease in oak trees, has been detected in Canandaigua, Ontario County. This is the third location in New York State where oak wilt has been confirmed and the second location discovered in 2016. Oak wilt is a serious tree disease in the eastern United States, killing thousands of oaks each year in forests, woodlots, and home landscapes. Oak wilt is caused by the fungus, *Ceratocystis fagacearum*, which grows in the water-conducting vessels of host trees, preventing water transport. As water movement within the tree is slowed, the leaves wilt and drop off, and eventually the tree dies. DEC asks the public to report any occurrences where an oak tree died over a short period of time, especially if it occurred between July and August, to the Forest Health Information Line toll-free at 1-866-640-0652.
