Farm food safety is common-sense practices organized to assist farmers to improve their skill set to continue to grow safe and healthy food. Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) training will be offered **September 26 and 27** @ Southern Tier West in Salamanca, NY. Day One of this training will be an educational training on farm food safety principles and practices to provide the background and information for farmers to understand how to minimize the risk of food born disease contamination. Day Two will be for those who want help with writing a farm food safety plan. If you want to be certified under the GAPs or HGAPs program, a farm food safety plan is needed for the audit.

DEC Extends Public Comment Period on Draft Chronic Wasting Disease Plan Through September 15

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos today announced that DEC will accept written comments on the draft New York State Interagency Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) Risk Minimization Plan for an additional two weeks through **September 15, 2017**. The plan describes potential regulatory changes and actions that DEC and the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets believe are necessary and appropriate to minimize the risk of CWD entering or spreading in New York. The plan was designed to protect both wild white-tailed deer and moose, as well as captive cervids, including deer and elk held at enclosed facilities. The draft Chronic Wasting Disease plan is available for review at http://www.dec.ny.gov/animals/7191.html. Written comments will be accepted through September 15. Geothermal Heating and Cooling Seminar: Student Rates Available

Earlier this year, New York adopted a policy framework for renewable heating and cooling, and a working knowledge of geothermal heat pumps will be an important part of building design as we move into a renewable energy future. The New York Geothermal Energy Organization (NY-GEO) supported by The NYS Energy Research and Development Agency (NYSERDA), has engaged instructor Jay Egg to bring a 5 credit course to Buffalo on **November 14** from 9am-3pm at the National Grid VIP Conference Center, 144 Kensington Avenue. The one-day course gives students the knowledge and tools to understand how geothermal heating and cooling might work for a given building. Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) Updates

On Wednesday, August 23rd, the nine Northeastern and Mid-Atlantic states that participate in the <u>Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative</u> (RGGI) proposed a regional cap trajectory that will provide an additional 30% emissions cap by 2030. Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper Releases State of Our Waters Report

Buffalo Niagara Riverkeeper is now Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper, with a new logo to better reflect their activities. They also released their *State of Our Waters* report which presents an overview of the health of Western New York waterways, highlights recent success and improvements, as well as identifies continuing and emerging challenges. The organization also presented a strategy for a regional approach to protect, restore and connect people to clean water, culminating with the announcement of an inaugural *Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper Weekend*, to be held annually on the third weekend in May, beginning in 2018. The *State of Our Waters* report (available at BNWaterkeeper.org) provides a user-friendly snapshot of the current status of the health of the region's water. It identifies historical turning points and major work accomplished to date, presents ongoing and emerging challenges, and recommends a regional action agenda to prioritize clean water investments and activities. The summary report is based on the interpretation of decades of organizational research, dozens of local, state and federal government studies, and peer-reviewed scientific analysis from academic institutions.

The 2017 EJSCREEN is here!

<u>EJSCREEN</u> is an environmental justice mapping and screening tool that provides Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with a nationally consistent dataset and approach for combining environmental and demographic indicators. EPA recently updated this useful tool in an effort to expand the way it engages with EJSCREEN users.

Climate Change Info-EPA Web Info Available at Chicago Website

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) website is no longer a resource for info on climate change. Previously, it was one of the foremost web resources for information related to the science of climate change. NY-Sun Solar Guidebook and Technical Assistance for Local Governments

NYSERDA recently developed and launched the NY-Sun Solar Guidebook for Local Governments. The Guidebook includes updates to the NYS Unified Solar Permit and guidance on the New York State fire code, along with other practical information to aid local officials. Does your town need an expert's opinion on a solar question? Local governments can access free training and technical assistance from NYSERDA's NY-Sun Photovoltaic Trainers Network (PVTN). The PVTN can help with all types of questions relating to New York State's solar electric market. The PVTN offers in-person trainings for municipal officials statewide and a set of online resources about solar energy.

Buffalo Zoo Helping Protect Rhinos from Poachers

The Buffalo Zoo often works with state and federal agencies on various conservation projects. This past winter, the Zoo need to trim the horn of their Indian rhinoceros, Tashi, due to signs of wear and a fear that the horn would break unexpectedly. Although they are composed mainly of keratin – the same common material that makes up hair, nails, feathers, wool, and hooves – rhino horns are valued in some parts of the world as symbols of wealth or for use in traditional medicine, even though the horns have been shown to have no medicinal value. This demand for rhino horn leads to the poaching of these endangered animals and the illegal trade in their horns. The section of Tashi's horn is now being used to train wildlife detector dogs that aid their human Inspector partners in detecting animal products (and sometimes live animals) that people attempt to illegally import into the United States.

Play the Climate Challenge Game

National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), Ecoresearch.net and the DecareboNet research project have partnered on a "game" called <u>Climate Challenge</u> that gets everyday people to pit their predictions about climate change and its effects against the opinions of experts around the world in an effort to see if the "wisdom of the crowd" can come up with answers faster than experts alone. Players are encouraged to research answers to questions about things like annual Arctic Sea Ice minimum coverage or the monthly average global surface temperature before submitting their answers. Players can come back every month for new questions, and see how they are doing compared to experts, friends, and the collective "crowd" and can win prizes by guessing closest to the actual value for a given question each month.

Genetically Modified Moths may be Released in New York

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved an open-air trial of genetically-modified (GM) diamondback moths (*Plutella xylostella*). The caterpillar of this invasive pest insect eats cabbage, broccoli and other *Brassica* plant relatives. The GM moths carry a gene that kills female offspring before they mature. Having fewer females available for mating cuts overall moth numbers, so releasing modified male moths in crop fields would theoretically reduce insecticide use. After completing successful lab and cage trials, Cornell University entomologist Tony Shelton and colleagues are planning a release of GM moths on 10 acres of *Brassica* fields at the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station in Geneva. The team has clearance to release 10,000 moths at a time, and up to 30,000 weekly. The trial's exact timeline remains up in the air. Researcher Looking for Downy Mildew on Impatiens

For gardeners with impatiens plants, keep an eye out for downy mildew, a fungus which can kill the plants. The fungus has been found in Lockport and a Cornell researcher is looking for live samples of impatiens with downy mildew to aid them in research to improve resistance. Symptoms include yellowing leaves; a white coating on the backs of the leaves indicates downy mildew. If you think your impatiens has downy mildew, put a bucket over the plant (so the disease doesn't spread), but don't pull the plant out. Email Daughtrey at mld9@cornell.edu and she will tell you what she needs. There's also a related plant, Impatiens balsamina, also sometimes referred to simply as balsam, that can also get the disease, and Daughtrey would like samples from that as well.
