## DEC Launches New York Harmful Algal Blooms Notification and Reporting System

DEC and the NYS Department of Health have started the 2023 online New York Harmful Algal Bloom System (NYHABS) interactive map. DEC is asking the public and trained algal bloom samplers to send reports of HABs with photos electronically via a [simple, mobile phone-friendly form](#). Once evaluated by DEC and DOH, reports are posted to the [NYHABS page](#) providing easy access to inform the public about HAB locations in New York. Most algae blooms are harmless. However, exposure to toxins and other substances from certain HABs can make people and animals sick. HABs have been monitored closely across New York State since 2012. DEC's Division of Water recently published an analysis of HABs titled: "[Detections of cyanobacteria harmful algal blooms \(cyanoHABs\) in New York State, United States \(2012–2020\)](#)."

## Environmental Working Group Provides List of Verified Sunscreens

While sunscreens protect us from damaging UV rays, they can also expose us to harmful chemicals. Oxybenzone, a hormone-disrupting sunscreen chemical which has been shown to absorb through the skin, has declined in usage due to consumer demand. ## **Legislation to Allow Electronic Repairs.**

The [Digital Fair Repair Act](#) is a new law that should make it easier for consumers to repair certain electronic devices, including laptops and smartphones, thereby saving money and reducing harmful e-waste. The law compels manufacturers doing business in the state to make repair parts, tools, and documentation, including schematics, available to the public, something companies had not been required to do in the past. It goes into effect on **July 1, 2023**. This should increase the availability of electronic device repair and bring down prices. Until now, independent repair businesses haven't always had the tools and information they needed to fix broken devices, forcing consumers to go back to the manufacturers for repairs or to just buy replacements. The new law is meant to increase competition for repair work—and let consumers fix their own gadgets if they feel technically capable. The law covers electronic devices purchased at retail, including devices popular with consumers like laptops, smartphones, and tablets. It does not apply to so-called white goods, an industry term that typically refers to big appliances like refrigerators and washing machines.

## **Household Hazardous Waste Dropoff**

Erie County residents have the option of using the County's "Voucher Drop-off program" which enables residents to bring up to 50lbs. of eligible hazardous waste to the Hazman facility in Tonawanda at no cost. ## **'Clean. Drain. Dry.' Your Watercraft to Protect Waters from Aquatic Invasive Species**

DEC reminded boaters to clean, drain, and dry their boats and trailers and disinfect their fishing gear before recreating in New York's waters to prevent the spread of harmful aquatic invasive species (AIS). Watercraft inspection stewards (boat stewards) are deploying across the state to educate and assist the public in cleaning equipment this season to prevent the introduction and spread of non-native plants and animals in New York waterbodies. Boat stewards will be stationed at more than 200 boat launches and decontamination stations throughout the state by Memorial Day weekend. Identified by their blue vests, boat stewards can provide a refresher on how to inspect your boat and gear and offer information on AIS in New York. All New York residents and visitors have a role to play in protecting state waters from invasive species. ## **Western New York Young Birder Club**

The [Western New York Young Birder Club](#) (WNY YBC) is designed to help connect young and young at heart people with birds. Young birders of all ages are welcome! The WNY YBC organizes monthly events, sends a monthly email newsletter including the "Bird of the Month" feature and updates on [club outings](#), and serves as a resource for the community to connect with family-friendly birding experiences. WNY YBC recognizes that birding is often a quiet and calm activity that doesn't always match the exuberance of young birders – thus they are creating a space where an enthusiastic joy in birds can take flight. ## Lake Erie Lake Trout Stocking

Lake Erie produces a trophy lake trout fishery, with an average fish weighing about 10 pounds and many in the 20-plus pound class. The [current state record](#) caught 20 years ago also hails from Lake Erie. Lake trout are stocked annually as part of a long-term rehabilitation program. Fish raised by the US Fish and Wildlife Service at the Allegheny National Fish Hatchery in Warren, PA were recently trucked to Lake Erie and stocked offshore of Dunkirk, NY by DEC staff aboard the Research Vessel Argo. This year New York received 80,000 and Pennsylvania 120,000 as part of a new rotational stocking program. Prior to stocking, each fish had its adipose fin clipped and a coded wire tag inserted in its snout. This allows data to be collected on recaptured fish over time. Recently, DEC staff sampled the first naturally reproduced lake trout observed in Lake Erie in 60 years near Barcelona, NY. Genetic testing confirmed that these wild fish were the offspring of our stocked fish. Certainly, promising news for the lake trout fishery!

## Have Environmental Concerns? Report Them

The public is invited to report environmental concerns to the U.S. Attorney's Office. Environmental and public health concerns may be about air quality; water pollution; dumping, burying or burning of chemicals or toxic waste; climate change; health; workplace condition; the application of pesticides and their effects on wildlife; wetlands destruction; medications; cosmetics; biological products; oil and chemical spills; and discriminatory environmental and health impacts caused by recipients of federal funds. ## DEC Pesticide Advice

As of January 1, 2023, DEC reclassified certain neonicotinoid (neonic) pesticide products as "restricted use." Products containing imidacloprid, acetamiprid, and thiamethoxam that are labeled for foliar, widespread outdoor use, and/or seed treatment are no longer permitted to be applied by homeowners. These products contain chemicals like nicotine, and the reclassification was taken to protect New York's environmental resources - especially pollinators. If you are not a certified applicator, the product must be legally disposed of by giving to a certified pesticide applicator or taking to a Household Hazardous Waste disposal event. . ## Regenerate NY: \$850,000 in Grants Now Available for Eligible Private Forest Landowners

The 'Regenerate NY' Forestry Cost Share Grant Program is designed to assist private landowners in growing the next generation of forests, which are crucial for mitigating climate change, providing wildlife habitat, protecting air and water quality, and supplying an important renewable resource. Regenerate NY is funded by New York State's Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) and managed by DEC's Division of Lands and Forests. Private landowners planning to restore or establish five or more acres of forest land in New York State, may apply for grant awards ranging from a minimum of \$10,000 to a maximum of \$100,000, with a required 25 percent match. Eligible projects include, but are not limited to, planting trees, soil scarification, removing competing vegetation that would interfere with seedling establishment and growth, and installation of deer fence. Applicants must work with a forester or a qualified natural resource professional to develop their project. Applications can be [submitted through the NYS Grants Gateway](#) and will be accepted until 5 p.m. on **Oct. 6, 2023**, or until funds are depleted, whichever comes first. Grants will be awarded on a rolling basis. Applicants need to establish an account in the Grants Gateway System. Once registered, applicants can search the Grants Gateway for "Regenerate NY."

## Help Track Spotted Lanternfly

[Spotted lanternfly \(SLF\)](#) is an invasive pest that feeds on a variety of plants including grapes, hops and maple trees, posing a severe threat to New York State's forests and agriculture. SLF was first found in PA in 2014, and [several populations have since been found in NY](#), including Buffalo as of September 2022. SLF's preferred host plant, tree-of-heaven (TOH), is already found in many locations across New York State. Help survey for SLF and TOH by picking a location, surveying it 2-3 times throughout 2023 and reporting your observations. WNY PRISM is looking for a few more volunteers to help track SLF by setting up and monitoring a trap! ## Public Comments, Civic Engagement and Activism

**\*\*This section will share ways to engage and follow policy at the federal and state level. Voting is one action, but civic engagement requires us to share our views and desires with our elected officials.**

**Public Comment Period to Close July 10** - DEC has released the [Draft Division of Materials Management Program Policy 7](#) - Biosolids Recycling in New York State – Interim Strategy for the Control of PFAS Compounds (DMM7) for a 60-day public comment period. DMM7 establishes interim PFOS and PFOA criteria for biosolids that are recycled in New York State and actions that will be taken by DEC based on those results. This interim policy will remain in place until EPA issues risk-based standards applicable to biosolids that will be recycled, and DEC completes a rulemaking to incorporate those standards, or more stringent standards if deemed appropriate. Persons wishing to comment on DMM7 have the opportunity to *submit written comments until July 10, 2023*. Comments can be submitted by email to [OrganicRecycling@dec.ny.gov](mailto:OrganicRecycling@dec.ny.gov). Please include "Comments on Draft DMM7" in the subject line of the email.

**Contact elected representatives today!** You don't have to be an energy or climate expert to make a difference. [Get their contact info](#). Then weigh in on the below!

[Birds and Bees Protection Act](#)-ban and prohibit certain uses of neonicotinoids, including on certain seed coatings by 2026 and for turf and ornamental uses by 2025. Passed the Assembly, bill in in Senate Environmental Committee. **Contact state senators.**

[Packaging Reduction and Recycling Infrastructure Act \(S.4246/A.5322\)](#)- would require manufacturers – not taxpayers – to be responsible for the cost of collecting and recycling the packaging waste they create. This will reduce packaging waste, increase recycling, eliminate toxic chemicals in packaging, reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

## Tips for the Environment:

- **If You Care, Leave It There**- While we all want to help young or injured wildlife, we need to understand their behavior and avoid personal injury. While most young wildlife learn survival skills from one or both parents, some receive little or no care. Often, wild animals stay away from their young, especially when people or pets are present. For these young animals, the perils of survival are a natural part of life in the wild. Unfortunately, well-intentioned individuals may attempt to care for young wild animals they believe to be abandoned or in need of assistance. These human interactions typically do more harm than good. Appreciate wildlife from a safe distance and resist the urge to touch or pick them up. If they appear to be sick or behaving abnormally, [contact your DEC regional wildlife office](#). Remember that young wildlife are not pets. Keeping wildlife in captivity is illegal and harmful to the animal. Wild animals are not well-suited for life in captivity and may carry diseases that can be transferred to humans. If they are obviously injured or orphaned, [call a wildlife rehabilitator](#)
