Agriculture, Food & Environmental Systems In-service

Invasive Aquatic Plant Hydrilla Found at Locations in Niagara River

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced that hydrilla, an invasive aquatic plant, was found at two additional locations along the eastern shore of the Niagara River. The aquatic invasive was found and treated at a marina in North Tonawanda last year. This past summer, a hydrilla plant found by a boat steward during a routine inspection prompted another round of surveys along the Niagara River. Water Recreationists are reminded to "clean, drain and dry" boats and equipment before putting in the water. Hydrilla is a federally listed noxious weed and a prohibited plant under State invasive species regulations. It spreads quickly, outcompeting native aquatic plants for space and interfering with activities such as boating and fishing.

This summer, we are mobilizing volunteers around the country to document plastic pollution at U.S. National Parks using our <u>TrashBlitz research platform</u>. As of December 23, 2021, all beekeepers in NYS are required to register with Ag and Markets and renew their registration annually regardless of whether you are selling nucleus colonies or queens or not. Public Encouraged to Report Potential Beech Leaf Disease Infections

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has announced that Beech Leaf Disease (BLD), which affects all species of beech trees, has been identified in 35 counties in New York State to date. Much is still unknown about BLD, including how it spreads, but it can kill mature beech trees in six to 10 years and saplings in as little as two years. BLD symptoms are associated with the nematode *Litylenchus crenatae mccannii*. It is unknown whether the nematode causes all of the damage, or if it is in association with another pathogen such as a virus, bacteria, or fungus. DEC is asking the public to submit reports through NYimapInvasives if they encounter a beech tree showing signs of BLD, especially for counties where BLD has not yet been confirmed. The main symptom to look for on beech foliage is darkened striping between the veins, which is best seen when looking up through the canopy. Leaves with severe symptoms can be heavily banded and crinkled, with a thickened leathery texture. For more information about beech leaf disease, visit DEC's website. "State of the Great Lakes" 2022 Report

The Governments of Canada and the United States are pleased to release the <u>State of the Great Lakes 2022</u> reports, which provide an overview of the status and trends of the Great Lakes ecosystem. There has been tremendous progress to restore and protect the Great Lakes, including the reduction of toxic chemicals, and a reduction in the establishment of new non-indigenous aquatic species. However, some indicator assessments demonstrate that there are still significant challenges, including the impacts of nutrients, especially in Lake Erie and localized areas, and the impacts of invasive species. Climate change is already exacerbating some threats. The continued actions of many groups and individuals are contributing to further improvements in the Great Lakes. Overall, the Great Lakes are assessed by the State of the Great Lakes indicators as Fair and the trend is Unchanging.

New "Tackle Box" Smartphone Feature Launched

DEC's official app, <u>HuntFishNY</u>, has been updated with a handy new feature called "The Tackle Box." Now you can instantly access all sorts of helpful information such as fishing regulations, fish stocking, and fishing access locations throughout New York State—all within an easy-to-use map-based interface. There is also an offline version to use when cell service isn't available.

Locally-Driven Actions Continue to Support Nation-Leading Directives in New York's Climate Act

The newest Western New York communities to achieve bronze certification in the <u>Climate Smart Communities</u> <u>Certification (CSC) program</u> are the <u>Village of Lancaster</u> (Erie County) and <u>City of North Tonawanda</u> (Niagara County). By taking meaningful actions to mitigate and adapt to climate change, these local governments successfully met the criteria to be recognized as leaders and become certified in the 2022 third-quarter round of the CSC Certification program.

Nonnative Tree Population Increase - USDA Forest Service Report

Nonnative tree species, while generally viewed as detriments to ecosystems, may provide important ecosystem services, such as carbon storage. A recent <u>USDA Forest Service Report</u> documents an increase in nonnative tree species in forests in the conterminous U.S. and on Pacific and Caribbean islands. The report can aid managers in assessing the impacts of nonnative trees and human interference on forest composition.

Tax Credits for Energy Efficiency Upgrades Extended

As part of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) of 2022, federal tax credits for energy efficient home upgrades have been extended. This means that if you made any qualifying home improvements to your primary residence after December 31, 2021, you may be eligible to claim credit on your federal taxes when you file for 2022. ENERGY STAR certifies a wide range of products for your home that help you save energy, save money, and protect the climate. The list of ENERGY STAR certified products that qualify for a federal tax credit range from equipment and products for your home, as well as improvements to your home's envelope or exterior - such as windows, doors, insulation, and similar items. To learn more about the tax credits that have been extended, you can read through the property tax credit guidance featured on the ENERGY STAR website. Additionally, Renewable Energy tax credits have also been extended and will be available through the end of 2023. These include incentives for Geothermal Heat Pumps, Residential Wind Turbines, Solar Energy Systems, and Fuel Cells.

2022 Online Exams for Licensed Guides Announced

Examinations are scheduled for individuals seeking to become licensed guides in New York State for camping; fishing; hiking; hunting; whitewater; rock climbing; ice climbing; and certified skilled with boats and canoes. A guide is a person at least 18 years of age who offers services for hire, part or all of which include directing, instructing, or aiding another individual in fishing, hunting, camping, hiking, whitewater rafting/canoeing/kayaking, or rock and ice climbing. Applicants need not be a resident of New York State to receive a guide's license. Exams in 2022 will be online. The registration deadline for exams is seven days before exam. Instructions, registration information, an outline of exam content can be found on DEC's Licensed Guide Program webpage. The last exam date for 2022 is **October 14**.

Farmland Protection Grants Available

The NYS Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce the availability of funds for the Round 18 Farmland Protection Implementation Grants (FPIG) Program – Conservation Easement Projects. The intent is to fund the implementation of certain farmland protection activities intended to maintain the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry and its supporting land base and to protect the environmental and landscape preservation values associated with agriculture. Grant applications will be accepted on a continuous basis. The RFA will remain open and awards will be made until such time as available funds are fully committed, or the RFA is closed.

Soil Health Tool

The ABCs of Soil Health in an interactive tool that will walk you through facts about soil's role in agriculture and supporting life on this planet, and what we can do to better manage our soil through conservation. Funding for EV Charging Stations

Through Charge Ready NY, NYSERDA provides rebates of \$4,000 per charging port for Level 2 charging stations installed at public, workplace, and multi-unit dwelling parking lots. Additional incentives of \$500 per port may be awarded for installations within <u>disadvantaged communities</u>. Many utilities offer <u>incentives for installing charging</u> stations that can cover most of the installation costs and be used in tandem with New York State and federal tax credits.

Clean Energy Communities Program for Towns

Is your WNY town a member of the Clean Energy Communities Program? Check out the map <u>here</u> to see towns that are in the program and the actions that they have taken to save energy and often costs for their town. If your town isn't one of them, ask your elected official why they haven't made a commitment to cleaner energy.

Make Cigarette Butts Part of Your Cleanups

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. Locally, data from the Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup conducted by Ocean Conservancy indicates that more than 300,000 cigarette butts (35.3% of all items recovered) were collected from the Great Lakes in 2019. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts leach toxic chemicals, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. Regenerate NY Cost-Share Grants Available for Forest Landowners

Do you own between 10 and 1,000 acres of forest land and have an interest in improving your woods? DEC's Regenerate NY program provides cost-share grants to New York landowners looking to enhance forest regeneration on their property. Landowners who want to plant trees, control competing vegetation, restore a degraded forest stand, or exclude deer are encouraged to apply for project funding. Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

Buffalo has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the "Scrap it" program with six summer locations available for drop-off. Take an 'I Bird NY' Challenge

The annual I BIRD NY Challenges are live and open to birders of all ages and abilities across the state. To complete the Beginner's Birding Challenge (PDF), participants 16 years old and younger must identify 10 common New York bird species, while more seasoned birders are also encouraged to complete the Experienced Birding Challenge (PDF), in which participants of any age must identify 10 or more different bird species found across New York. Both entry forms are also available in Spanish. Entries can be submitted via email or mail until October 14. All challenge participants will be able to print a certificate of participation and be entered for a chance to win birding accessories. New this year: participants will also receive an extra entry for identifying half of the birds (5) on NYS Birding Trail sites! As an extra bonus, the first 50 participants from either challenge will also receive a special goodie bag of birding swag items. New Platform can Track Carbon for Individual Trees

The new nonprofit, called <u>CTrees</u> (its motto: "see the forest and the trees"), uses artificial intelligence to analyze satellite and aerial data along with local data from inventories of trees. As trees grow, or when they're lost to logging or fires, CTrees can use new satellite images to keep a running estimate of the total carbon. The methods, based on two decades of science, "come close to the accuracy of the gold standard" of on-the-ground measurement, says Sassan Saatchi, a senior scientist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, who is helping lead CTrees as a side project.

Recycling Conundrums- Why aren't all #1 Plastics Recycled?

The #1 plastics, known as PET (polyethylene terephthalate) plastics, can be recycled if they are bottles (shampoo, soda, salad dressing). Those #1 plastic clamshell containers (berries, bakery items etc.) are not acceptable. Why? These containers are made by thermoforming which creates the package by stretching a heated sheet of plastic over a mold. Thermoformed plastics have less viscosity and are more brittle, making these plastics unsuitable for bottle production. So it's essential to separate thermoformed PET from other PET containers when recycling as most facilities lack sorting equipment that can separate thermoformed packaging from other plastics. Plastic waste is now found in almost every marine habitat, from the ocean surface to deep sea sediments to the ocean's vast mid-water region, as well as the Great Lakes. The National Academies of Sciences has published a report that responds to a request in the bipartisan Save Our Seas 2.0 Act for a scientific synthesis of the role of the United States both in contributing to and responding to global ocean plastic waste. 2022 New York Harmful Algal Blooms Notification and Reporting System

DEC has announced the start of the 2022 online Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs) map and reporting system to inform the public about HABs locations in New York. Most algae blooms are harmless. However, exposure to toxins and other substances from certain HABs can make people and animals sick. DEC is asking the public and trained algal bloom samplers to send reports of HABs with photos electronically via a <u>simple, mobile phone-friendly form</u>. Lead Pipes in your House? Get a Free Water Test

Help Track Spotted Lanternfly

Spotted lanternfly (SLF) is an invasive pest from Asia that feeds on a variety of plants including grapes, hops, and maple trees, posing a severe threat to NY forests and agriculture. SLF has been found in several locations in NY but has not yet spread to much of the state. One potential pathway for the spread of SLF is its preferred host plant, tree of heaven (TOH), which is already found in many locations across NY. Learn more about the insect here. We are seeking volunteers like you to look for SLF and TOH in your area. Visit the NY iMapInvasives website to learn about the project, and sign up for a grid square on the map to monitor.

Box Tree Moth Watch

The New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets (AGM) has confirmed the detection of box tree moth in parts of Western New York. Box tree moth is an invasive pest from East Asia that poses a major threat to the boxwood plant, an ornamental shrub that is a valuable part of the U.S. nursery industry, with an annual economic impact estimated at \$141 million (American Hort). AGM is urging residents and the horticultural industry to spot and report the box tree moth to the Department through its reporting tool at: https://arcg.is/1Df8Se.

Hemlock Wooly Adelgid Management

Hemlock woolly adelgid (HWA, *Adelges tsugae*) is an aphidlike, soft-bodied insect, almost too small to see with the naked eye. Native to Asia, HWA was first reported in the eastern United States in the 1950s. It has since spread to 20 states and two Canadian provinces. HWA feed on tree sap by inserting their mouthparts at the base of the needles and removing plant fluids. Their feeding causes the needles to turn gray, die, and drop from the tree. Branch dieback progresses from the lower branches to the top of the tree. Severe infestations may bring about premature needle drop, reduced twig growth, dieback, and tree death. <u>Info and resources</u>.

Public Comments, Civic Engagement and Activism

**This section will share ways to engage and follow policy at the federal and state level. Voting is one action, but civic engagement requires us to share our views and desires with our elected officials.

Spread the Word:

<u>Clean Water, Clean Air, and Green Jobs Bond Act</u> will be on the 2022 NY ballot, and would fund critical environmental protection, sustainability, and restoration projects across the state, which will create thousands of jobs and help NYS achieve its bold climate goals. This Act would also help fund the electrification of school buses and the charging infrastructure needed so our children don't have to breathe dirty diesel fumes anymore.

- Equitable siting of environmental facilities (A2103-D/S8830) legislation requires the existing burdens of EJ communities to be considered as part of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) and when DEC is making certain permitting decisions. This legislation is significant in shifting the longstanding inequitable pattern of sitting polluting facilities in environmental justice communities.
- **Crypto-mining moratorium** (A7389C/S6486D) legislation was passed in the final days of session and is a significant win to ensure the climate and environmental impacts of the cryptocurrency industry are assessed. This legislation places a two-year moratorium on specific methods of cryptocurrency mining and prevents the expansion or renewal of permits for operations conducted at power plants running on fossil fuels.
- Improving air quality in environmental justice communities (A6150B/S4371D) will create air quality standards for toxic contaminants, particularly in low-income communities and communities of color.
- Water affordability data (A7754B/S5451C) legislation for the first time ever will require all water, gas, and electric utilities to report data on shut-offs, debt, and more, so we can fully understand and address increasingly unaffordable utility services across New York.
- Streams protection (A6652/S4162) legislation will protect up to 41,000 miles of New York streams, in addition to supporting wildlife and jobs in the recreation economy. This legislation is so important because the health of our streams is linked to the safety of our drinking water.
- Carpet recycling (A9279-A/S5027-B) legislation will establish a carpet recycling program in New York, requiring carpet manufacturers to be responsible for the costs associated with carpet collection and recycling. The legislation also prohibits the use and treatment of PFAS chemicals on carpets.
- Natural organic reduction (A382/S5535) legislation will allow New York to follow the lead of Colorado, Oregon, and Washington in providing an eco-friendly alternative to cemetery burial or cremation. Cemetery burial and cremation are both resource-intensive and have undesirable environmental impacts. Natural organic reduction is estimated to save a metric ton of carbon dioxide when chosen over cremation or burial.

Tips for the Environment:

Campaign for the Climate- Clean Water, Clean Air, and Green Jobs Bond Act will be on the 2022 NY ballot and our voting at all levels can impact the environment. The NRDC has prepared a handbook to help New Yorkers understand the issues and take action. Projects supported by the Bond Act will: safeguard clean drinking water, preventing contamination and pollution; update aging or failing water and sewer infrastructure; reduce carbon pollution that causes climate change; preserve forests, wetlands, and other wildlife habitats and more.

Check your voter registration is up to date before Oct. 14 deadline- Erie County, and Niagara County.

Wish-cycling (tossing things in the bin that you hope will be recycled) leads to many issues along the recycling process including damaging equipment and recycling workers. Items that measure less than 3 inches in diameter are difficult for recycling facilities-better to toss it. Good news-Pizza boxes can be recycled and Domino's want you to know-check out their box.
