Erie County has contracted with Hazman to provide vouchers that allow residents to bring up to 50 pounds of HHW to Hazman at no cost to you. ## Public Hearing on Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Funds

On **September 2 at 2:00 p.m.** the Environmental Facilities Corporation (EFC) and the Department of Health (DOH) will hold a virtual joint public hearing to accept comments on the Draft Federal Fiscal Year 2021 Intended Use Plans (IUPs) for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) and the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF). The CWSRF and DWSRF programs are available to municipalities and certain non-municipal entities in New York State to finance water quality and drinking water related projects. The Draft IUPs include lists of projects that could receive financing between October 1, 2020 and September 30, 2021, the next IUP financing period. Eligible entities interested in financing one or more projects not listed in the Draft CWSRF IUP or Draft DWSRF IUP should submit the appropriate IUP project listing information as soon as possible but no later than **September 21**. Written comments on the Draft IUPs must be submitted by **5:00 p.m. September 21**. The draft CWSRF and DWSRF IUPs include revisions to incentivize water infrastructure improvements in Environmental Justice communities. [EFC](#) has also released amended SRF Hardship Policies for public comment that will enable more communities to access zero-interest financing for water infrastructure improvement projects. ## Proposed Part 496: Statewide Emissions Limits

DEC is proposing a new [6 NYCRR Part 496, Statewide Greenhouse Gas Emission Limits](#). The proposed rule adopts limits on the emission of greenhouse gases in 2030 and 2050, as a percentage of 1990 emissions, per the requirements of the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act. It applies to all emission sources in the State, but the rule does not itself impose compliance obligations. ## **NYSERDA Green Jobs Green New York Energy Studies**

Small businesses and not-for-profit organizations can now receive an energy study **AT NO COST** to help them identify opportunities to make their buildings more energy efficient. The energy study is a valuable tool to understand how to reduce energy usage and costs in your facility, and it provides a "road map" to plan for improvements that can be made as budgets permit. *NYSERDA is waiving the fee for a limited time.* Small businesses with 100 or fewer Full-Time Equivalent Employees (FTEs) company-wide or not-for-profit organizations of any size are eligible for the program. Previously the customer's cost-share ranged from \$100 to \$500 per building based on the number of FTEs. The energy study includes: A comprehensive walk through of the facility; site staff interviews; utility bill analysis; fuel-neutral, unbiased evaluation of potential low-cost/no-cost and capital improvement energy efficiency upgrades; and a report that outlines potential energy and cost savings opportunities for your facility. Once the study is complete, you receive assistance in identifying potential utility incentives and low-cost financing options to help take the next steps toward implementing energy saving projects. Note: A small business or not-for-profit who had a prior NYSERDA energy study is eligible for the program if their study was performed at least three years ago. ## **If You Received Unsolicited Seeds: Report to USDA**

New Yorkers who receive seeds from a foreign source that they did not order, should not plant them. Please mail the sealed package of seeds, the original packaging, the residents' contact information, and any additional relevant details directly to the USDA at: Office of the State Plant Health Director of New York c/o Christopher Zaloga, 500 New Karner Rd., Albany, NY 12205. Legitimate seeds imported into the United States are rigorously tested to ensure quality and prevent introduction of invasive species, insects and diseases, so people who receive seeds that they did not order, that are mislabeled, or are from a questionable source, should not plant or handle the seeds. ## **California Highway Paved with Plastic**

A newly repaved stretch of highway in Oroville, California, looks like an ordinary road. But it's the first highway in the country to be paved in part with recycled plastic—the equivalent of roughly 150,000 plastic bottles per mile of the three-lane road. The new type of road resists potholes and cracking and can last two to three times longer than standard asphalt. The company's process begins with PET, the common form of plastic found in plastic bottles and other single-use packaging, and chemically recycles it back into its original form of polymer chains. That then becomes a binder engineered to hold recycled asphalt together. For more info, [visit](#).

## **Double Up Food Bucks at Farmers Markets**

The 2020 Double Up Food Bucks season is officially underway at farmers markets, mobile markets, farm stands, and small retail and grocery sites across New York State! The Double Up market season will run through October 31, 2020 at participating locations. Double Up Food Bucks is a national model for healthy food incentive programs that provides individuals and families who receive SNAP benefits with a \$1-to-\$1 match, up to \$20 per day, that encourages the purchase of healthy, locally grown fruits and vegetables. Double Up piloted in 2014 at 7 market sites and has since grown to include over 100 unique participating sites statewide. The program has expanded to include more sites than ever before in 2020. ## **Boat Produces Hydrogen Fuel from Seawater and Solar**

The Energy Observer is a 100% energy self-sufficient boat, sailing around the world to prove the usefulness of cutting-edge technologies, including a hydrogen fuel cell made with help from Toyota. The boat uses power from its solar panels to generate hydrogen. During the day, 200 square meters of solar panels charge up the boat's lithium ion batteries. Any extra energy is stored as hydrogen, thanks to a special fuel cell that goes by the name Rex H2 (short for Range Extender H2) made by Toyota. The fuel cell brings in seawater, removes the salt and then separates the H from the pure H2O with electricity. Here for [more info](#).

## **Dicamba Pesticide Ban**

The NYS DEC is cancelling the registration of three dicamba-based herbicides following a United States Court of Appeals for the [Ninth Circuit decision \(PDF\)](#). All use, including storage of opened containers, is prohibited after July 31, 2020. Dicamba kills annual and perennial broadleaf weeds and is primarily used for weed control for grain crops and turf areas. Drift from spraying has caused damage to trees and neighboring areas. The 2020 "I BIRD NY" Challenge is designed for beginner and experienced birders. The [I BIRD NY program](#) was launched to build on the State's efforts to increase access to New York's vast natural resources and promote low-cost opportunities to explore the great outdoors and connect with nature. The State's I Bird NY program provides resources for New Yorkers who would like to get outdoors and engage in birding all year long. ## **DEC Seeks Pool Owners for Citizen Science Survey of Invasive Beetle**

DEC is encouraging New York pool owners to participate in [DEC's annual Asian Longhorned Beetle Swimming Pool Survey](#). This is the time of year when [Asian longhorned beetles \(ALB\)](#) emerge as adults and are most active outside of their host tree. The goal of the survey is to look for and find these exotic, invasive beetles before these pests cause serious damage to our forests and street trees. They have caused the death of hundreds of thousands of trees across the country. DEC is requesting that people with swimming pools periodically check their pool filters for any insects that resemble ALB. No Pool? No Problem! You can still help! Look for the telltale signs of ALB damage on your trees, such as exit holes, accumulation of coarse sawdust, pits in the bark, and oozing sap. If you suspect an ALB, take a photo and Send an [email](#) with the subject heading "ALB Pool Survey". Text an image to (518) 491-7391, and type "ALB Pool Survey" in the body of the text, or mail a printed image to the Forest Health Diagnostic Lab at 108 Game Farm Road, Delmar, NY 12054. Save the insect. Freeze the insect in a plastic bag or Tupperware container until you hear back from us.

## **Creating Warm Floors with Modular Recycled Rubber Panels**

Launched by entrepreneur Gary Hydock more than six years ago, the floating modularly designed panels not only provide a moisture barrier but can be installed over an undulating surface such as concrete without any mechanical attachment. From idea to finished product, the six-year journey included testing, certification, patent applications, and contractor-approved demonstration projects to bring the panels to market. Today, Hydock's Salamanca, NY-based company Seneca Radiant Technology (SRT) and its products are Green Spec® listed, qualify for LEED points and are sourced by contractors, residential home owners and commercial developers for new build, remodeling and restoration projects. In 2017, the company established Seneca Radiant UK, expanding its recycled rubber modular radiant heat panels internationally, Hydock said. Seneca Radiant heat panels are designed to be installed over an existing concrete slab on grade, suspended high rise slab, over existing standard framing or under the sub-floor. The panel is made from 100 percent recycled tire rubber crumb. Individual panels are ¾ inches thick and weigh less than four pounds each. The rubber modular panel is one square foot in dimension with an engineered tube routing channel in the underside to house the radiant tube. The panels are shaped so that they interlock like a jigsaw, in both directions, without the need for fixing to the sub-floor. This attachment system allows for ease of connection for each individual panel and the modular system as a whole, creating an overall heating system characterized by quick and easy installation for both DIY installers and professionals, the company said. ## **Online Course on Organic Farming Offered**

[Basics of Organic Farming](#) is a self-directed online course for beginning orchard and vegetable-crop farmers, existing organic farmers, and farmers in transition to organic production. This course is a joint effort of the Organic Farming Research Foundation (OFRF) and others. It consists of six modules: 1) soil health; 2) weed management; 3) irrigation and water management; 4) insect pest management; 5) disease management; and 6) economics and marketing. The first two modules are online, and OFRF is asking for farmer feedback to help develop the remaining modules.

## **National Young Farmers Coalition Introduces Racial Equity Toolkit**

The National Young Farmers Coalition has created a [Racial Equity Toolkit](#) designed to orient and guide members toward preliminary consciousness-raising and direct action. According to the National Young Farmers Coalition, it is an initial resource for people who are overwhelmed by the breadth and depth of the problem, and need help determining how to start dismantling racism in their communities.

## **'Carbon Cowboys' Documentary Series Highlights Regenerative Grazers**

[Carbon Cowboys](#), a 10-part documentary of short films by director Peter Byck, was released online by environmental nonprofit Carbon Nation in collaboration with Arizona State University. The 8- to 23-minute films highlight profitable regenerative grazers across the United States and in Canada. Byck says, "The film shows farmers working with nature, rather than against it. You see them caring for their animals and for their land. You see farmers making more money and creating an alternative to industrial farming."

### **Slow Roll Introduces Social Distance Rides**

While community events like Slow Roll Buffalo are currently suspended due to the state of emergency over the spread of COVID-19, yet parks are open to enjoy outdoor activity at safe social distance, Slow Roll is helping fill the void in communal gathering by posting the routes of our 2016 rides from five Buffalo parks and encouraging the public to ride individually for the benefit of our collective mental and physical health. University of Pittsburgh researchers have created a washable textile coating that repels liquids, such as blood and saliva, and also prevents viruses from adhering to its surface. The liquid- and virus-repellent coating is made with polytetrafluoroethylene (PTFE, the same polymer that makes Teflon nonstick) and polypropylene microfibers. ## Study Finds Fracking Linked to Rare Birth Defect in Horses

A new study has uncovered a link between fracking chemicals in farm water and a rare birth defect in horses—which researchers say could serve as a warning about fracking and human infant health. The study, published in [Science of the Total Environment](#), complements a growing body of research linking fracking to numerous human health effects, including preterm births and high-risk pregnancies. Cornell University veterinarians diagnosed five out of 10 foals born on one farm in Pennsylvania with the rare birth defect dysphagia which causes nursing foals to inhale milk instead of swallowing it, often resulting in pneumonia if milk gets into their lungs. There were higher levels of four kinds of polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) detected in water on that farm. Horses at a New York farm owned by the same individual and raised under similar techniques had healthy foals; the only difference between farms was the water supply. Read more [here](#).

The factors include existing attitudes and awareness about the risk of invasive species, the likelihood of adoption of preventive behaviours, barriers that may prevent some people from taking action and what might motivate them to take those actions.
