COVID-19: Virtual tours, Volunteering and Outdoor Appreciation

WNY Youth Climate Action Summit Public Workshops

Penn Dixie Fossil Park Opening

Beginning **June 1**, Penn Dixie Fossil Park & Nature Reserve is open daily to Penn Dixie members from 9 am to 4:30 pm. Beginning **June 15**, the park is open daily to all from 9 am to 4:30 pm. Tours are available every 30 minutes from 9:15 am to 2:45 pm. All visitors are required to make reservations in advance using our online system. Tickets are extremely limited and park attendance will be capped at 25% of capacity. A three-hour limit is in place for nonmembers. New safety measures include required face coverings and social distancing. If a visitor does not have a face covering, a mask will be provided at no charge. Tickets are \$12 for adults; \$11 for seniors, military, and students; and \$9 for children ages 3-17. Children under 3 and members are free. The first booking time each day is reserved for seniors (62+), families with seniors, and those with mobility impairments or health concerns. Harmful Algal Blooms: Reporting System Available

The DEC maintains an online Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs) map and reporting system to inform the public about HABs locations in New York. The public is encouraged to send reports of HABs with photos electronically via a [simple, mobile phone-friendly form](#). After DEC and Department of Health (DOH) evaluate the reports, they are posted to the site at [NYHABS](#). HABs vary in appearance from scattered green dots in the water, to long, linear green streaks, pea soup or spilled green paint, to blue-green or white coloration. People, pets and livestock should avoid contact with water that is discolored or has algal scums on the surface. Most algae blooms are harmless. Funding Available for Job Training in Energy Efficiency and Clean Technology

NYSERDA’s On-the-Job Training (OJT) for Energy Efficiency and Clean Technology program provides wage subsidies to eligible businesses to reduce the financial risk of hiring and training new workers, while developing job skills for new workers in energy efficiency and clean technology businesses. NYSERDA is working closely with the New York State Department of Labor (NYSDOL) to deliver this OJT program. NYSDOL will assist eligible businesses with developing OJT training plans as well as assessing necessary skills and available workers that match those skills. Incentives will be provided to businesses that hire workers for OJT enabling new workers to obtain clean energy field experience that cannot be gained by classroom training alone. All incentives, maximum funding amounts (i.e., caps), and COVID-19 specific provisions are subject to change on 12/31/20. EPA Launches Sustainable Materials Prioritization Tools

The EPA provides [Sustainable Materials Management Prioritization Tools](#) as a starting place for governments, trade associations, NGOs, companies, small enterprises, and other organizations to select materials. The tools provide a life cycle analysis which helps groups establish priorities for environmental improvement, focus their limited financial and human resources where action could offer greater holistic benefit, and consider key industries for collaboration. The SMM Prioritization Tools generate dynamic charts that present over 10 million data points from a fully transparent, open and freely available life cycle model created by EPA. These charts provide insights across more than 20 environmental, social and economic indicators for over 390 categories of goods and services in the United States.

Fabric Coating Created that Prevents Viral Adhesion

University of Pittsburgh researchers have created a washable textile coating that repels liquids, such as blood and saliva, and also prevents viruses from adhering to its surface. The liquid- and virus-repellent coating is made with polytetrafluoroethylene (PTFE, the same polymer that makes Teflon nonstick) and polypropylene microfibers. Invasive Red Lily Leaf Beetles Visible

The invasive red lily leaf beetle targets leaves of lily plants as they break the ground. Our daylilies are not impacted, but other lily leaves and flower buds are devoured by the adults and larvae. The adult is large enough to see it, with bright red with black legs. The adults move quickly, but can be removed by hand. Climate Change Research-A-thon: Community Groups and Faculty Invited to Participate

Climate Change Research-A-Thon is an initiative organized by Dr. Stephen Vermette through the Department of Geography & Planning at SUNY Buffalo State. The objective is to empower college students with interests in the environment, planning, sociology, economics, and law, among other disciplines, to brainstorm ways that WNY can address local climate change issues. Instructors of college courses are invited to incorporate this initiative within an existing course or to organize a student team, involving either a student club or a team organized specifically for the Research-A-Thon to tackle a specific question of their choosing from questions developed by local community groups or institutions. The involvement can be any length of time – working through an entire semester, a class assignment, or a one-day activity. The goal is to launch during the Fall 2020 and Spring 2021 semesters to accommodate scheduled courses. The outcomes of the Research-A-Thon – student products – will be presented on a web site. The web site will also include an edited summary of each effort. We anticipate presenting the student findings to the WNY community. Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

The City has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the “Scrap it” program with six summer locations available for drop-off. Solar-Powered Heritage Carousel

A solar-powered historic carousel had planned to open Summer 2020, but the pandemic delays have shifted the grand opening to spring 2021. The Buffalo Heritage Carousel, Inc. is nearing completion of the restoration of the 1924 Spillman carousel which features 34 hand carved and painted animals and 3 chariots. The Canalside building which will be its future home is currently under construction. No More Flat Tires

Goodyear introduced its latest “stretch concept” tire, the ReCharge, which theoretically never needs replacing or even rotating because it can replace worn treads from the inside. ReCharge tires extrude a high-tech compound of renewable materials including dandelion rubber and synthetic spider silk. The mixture is fed through a series of fine pipes out to the surface of the wheel where they dry, cure and set into brand new treads. These are a more environmentally responsible alternative to today’s standard tire composition, which requires the addition of either carbon black or silica to reinforce the structural capabilities of petroleum rubber. In this case, the synthetic spider silk can help augment the natural properties of dandelion rubber to reduce wear and extend the functional life of the tire. Instead of relying on air pressure, the replacement tread solution would be stored in replaceable canisters within the wheel hub. [More info.](#)

Screwworm Barrier in Panama

Screwworms once killed millions of dollars’ worth of cattle a year in the southern U.S. Their range extended from Florida to California, and they infected any living, warm-blooded animal: not only cattle but deer, squirrels, pets, and even the occasional human. The United States Department of Agriculture undertook what would be an immense, multidecade effort to wipe out the screwworms, first in the U.S. and then in Mexico and Central America—all the way down to the narrow strip of land that is the Isthmus of Panama. To keep the screwworms out, the USDA currently maintains an international screwworm barrier along the Panama-Colombia border.. Every week, planes drop 14.7 million sterilized screwworms reared in Panama over the rainforest that divides the two countries. Inspectors cover thousands of square miles by motorcycle, boat, and horseback, searching for stray screwworm infections north of the border. Read more at [screwworm containment.](#)

Study Finds Fracking Linked to Rare Birth Defect in Horses

A new study has uncovered a link between fracking chemicals in farm water and a rare birth defect in horses—which researchers say could serve as a warning about fracking and human infant health. The study, published this month in the journal [Science of the Total Environment](#), complements a growing body of research linking fracking to numerous human health effects, including preterm births and high-risk pregnancies. Veterinarians at Cornell University diagnosed five out of 10 foals born on one farm in Pennsylvania with the rare birth defect dysphagia which causes nursing foals to inhale milk instead of swallowing it, often resulting in pneumonia if milk gets into their lungs. There were higher levels of four kinds of polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) detected in water on that farm. Horses at a New York farm owned by the same individual and raised under similar techniques had healthy foals; the only difference between farms was the water supply. Read more [here](#).

More Durable Concrete using Biomimicry Principles

University of Colorado Boulder researchers have turned to biomimicry to help our future infrastructure. A synthetic molecule based on natural antifreeze proteins minimizes freeze-thaw damage and increases the strength and durability of concrete, improving its longevity and decreasing carbon emissions over its lifetime. The polyvinyl alcohol, or PVA—behaves exactly like these antifreeze proteins but is much more stable at a high pH, and is combined with another non-toxic, robust molecule—polyethylene glycol. This new method, published in [Cell Reports Physical Science](#), uses compounds that prevent ice crystal growth and mitigates frost damage in concrete infrastructure. Concrete is formed by mixing water, cement powder and various aggregates, like sand or gravel. “Since the 1930s, small air bubbles have been put into concrete to protect it from water and ice crystal damage. This allows any water that seeps into the concrete to have room to expand when it freezes. Without it, the surface of damaged concrete will flake off.” This allows road salts and other chemicals to leach into the concrete, which can then degrade embedded steel. In research tests, the new concrete performed as well as concrete with air bubbles with the benefit of lower permeability and a longer lifespan.
