Nuclear Waste Risks and West Valley Scoping Hearings

Come hear about the possible implications of not cleaning West Valley with its buried radioactive waste. Alan Lockwood, MD, will present the issues followed by a panel discussion on **Thursday, March 1** at 7pm at the Burchfield Penney Art Center. The presentation will also provide background so you can comment at the upcoming Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) hearings on **March 19-21** to collect public input. The Department of Energy and NYSERDA are proposing to conduct the final Supplemental EIS to forge a final determination of what to do with this nuclear material. New Partnership Brings Fresh Food Fellows

Groundwork Buffalo, Field & Fork Network and Grassroots Gardens are pleased to announce the Fresh Food Fellows: Urban Agriculture Entrepreneurship Program, a paid job training opportunity and certification program for Buffalo youth that will prepare the next generation of food and agriculture industry professionals for the workforce. Over the course of six months, participants will gain employable and transferable job skills by learning how to grow, cultivate and sell produce in an urban environment. The program, which will kick off in late March and run through August, brings three organizations together in partnership. Tree Seedlings Available to Protect Water Quality

Among their many benefits, trees help protect our streams and lakes by stabilizing soil and using nutrients that would otherwise wash into waterways. Through May 9, [DEC's Saratoga Tree Nursery](#) has a large variety of low-cost, native tree shrubs and seedlings for sale to the public. Available species include trees and shrubs ideal for streamside restoration and buffers, and a riparian species variety packet. DEC Conducting River Otter Surveys Throughout New York

River otter (*Lontra canadensis*) surveys are underway throughout New York State. The survey period extends from the beginning of December until the end of March. DEC personnel conduct these surveys by walking along waterbodies looking for any sign of otter including tracks, scat, slides, and otter themselves! The photo shows DEC staff next to otter tracks and slides. The purpose of these surveys is to assess the current status of river otter in New York State, including within the recovery zone where otter were reintroduced in the late 1990s/early 2000s. DEC is also requesting that the [public report sightings of river otter](#), as well as bobcat, fisher, and weasel in Upstate New York and beaver, gray fox, weasel, mink, coyote, and skunk on Long Island and New York City.

Grocery Stores are Going Green!

The average grocery store uses 1.5 million gallons of water each year. Grocery stores dispose of half a million pounds of food waste annually, nearly all of which goes to the landfill and use 660 lbs. of cleaning products containing 150 lbs. of hazardous chemicals. The New York State Pollution Prevention Institute (NYSP2I) and DEC teamed up to help grocers drive down their operating costs and reduce their environmental footprint. NYS Plastic Bag Task Force

Across New York, residents use 23 billion plastic bags annually. A significant number of these bags make their way into the environment causing litter and damaging wildlife, which can be seen within our waterways, along our streets and in our oceans and lakes. The New York State Plastic Bag Task Force generated their [final report \(PDF\)](#) with an analysis of the impacts of single-use plastic bags and several options for legislation that could help develop a statewide solution to the problem

Erie County to Follow Paris Climate Agreement

Erie County Executive Mark Poloncarz acknowledged that Erie County will adhere to the Paris Climate Agreement. Poloncarz announced completion of a new report, "Erie County Commits to Paris: How Erie County Can Meet U.S. Target Reductions for Greenhouse Gas Emissions", that reveals the county has already reached target reductions for reducing its carbon footprint. Overall the county's consumption of greenhouse gas emissions for our internal operations decreased by exactly 26% from 2005 to 2014. New Desalination Technology Recovers Lithium with Water

Scientists have developed a new process that makes safe drinking water while also recovering lithium ions. Lithium ions can then be put to use in batteries. The technique uses metal-organic frameworks (MOFs), which possess the largest internal surface area of any known material. This enables the MOFs to effectively capture, store and release different molecules. Beyond the uses in this new process, MOFs may also be utilized for carbon emission sponges, high-precision chemical sensors and urban water filters. Unlike reverse osmosis (RO) membranes, the water filtration process utilizing this new technique does not require water to be forced through at high pressures as RO does, saving significant energy costs. Communities Recycle More Plastics and Reduce Contamination Through Improved Education

Municipalities work to educate their residents about how to recycle more and recycle right, especially when it comes to plastics. Over the years, more plastics are entering the recycling stream as packaging evolves and more products come in plastics instead of other materials. And because there are so many different types of plastics—and which ones can be recycled varies from community to community—there's potential for plastics to end up in the wrong bin. We've seen that better communication with residents can lead to more and better recycling. Yet, often education materials are only updated when absolutely necessary, like when a recycling program changes what items it accepts since updating education materials can be resource-intensive. So, is there a program to help communities improve recycling education for plastics that is easy, economical, and effective? Three communities used a new resource—the [Plastics Recycling Terms and Tools](#)—and found that the answer is: yes!

Tool to Analyze Benefits of Green Infrastructure

A new approach to rechargeable batteries

A type of battery first invented nearly 50 years ago could change the face of energy storage technologies, thanks to a new finding by researchers at MIT. The battery, based on electrodes made of sodium and nickel chloride and using a new type of metal mesh membrane, could be used for grid-scale installations to make intermittent power sources such as wind and solar capable of delivering reliable baseload electricity. Although the basic battery chemistry the team used, based on a liquid sodium electrode material, was first described in 1968, the concept never caught on as a practical approach because it required the use of a thin membrane to separate its molten components, and the only known material with the needed properties for that membrane was a brittle and fragile ceramic. These paper-thin membranes made the batteries too easily damaged in real-world operating conditions, so apart from a few specialized industrial applications, the system has never been widely implemented. With new materials available to serve as the thin membrane, there may be new opportunities for this battery design. Native Fish Species Now Protected

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is asking anglers and outdoor enthusiasts to report Paddlefish sightings in State waters. The Paddlefish is native to southwestern New York, but disappeared from the state over a century ago due to dams and pollution in the area and it is now protected. DEC began a stocking program in 1998 to restore this species to the Allegheny Reservoir and to Chautauqua Lake and Conewango Creek of the Jamestown area. Two of the fish species have been caught in the Jamestown area in the last two years. DEC is now asking for the public's help with the State's recovery efforts by reporting the following details of Paddlefish seen in this area:

- Location and date where seen, including the name of the water body in Western NY and a nearby landmark. Please share information if visiting Pennsylvania and within 20 miles of New York.
- How the fish was observed (caught by angling, seen swimming in the water, dead on shore, etc.) If the fish is deceased, saving and freezing the anterior 6" of the snout could allow biologists to determine the age or stocking history of the fish.
- Approximate length of the fish, and a photo if available.

In addition, workshop participants are expected to produce a case study within six months of the workshop for our national, peer-reviewed case collection.
