Stewardship Appreciation Awards

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is now accepting nominations for the inaugural 2020 Stewardship Appreciation Awards. Not-for-profit organizations, individuals, educational institutions, and municipalities with formal agreements with DEC are eligible to apply. Nominees must be in good standing with DEC and New York State Environmental Conservation Law for the past three years. Nominees must have one of the following formal agreements with DEC: An active Volunteer Stewardship Agreement (VSA); A current Memorandum of Understanding; A current Use and Occupancy Agreement; or Proof of organized volunteer activities on State lands. DEC encourages those who meet the eligibility requirements and are committed to improving lands, waters, and facilities including, but not limited to, forest preserves, state forests, conservation easements, wildlife management areas, and environmental education centers to submit a nomination. Climate Change Research-A-thon: Community Groups and Faculty Invited to Participate

Climate Change Research-A-Thon is an initiative organized by Dr. Stephen Vermette through the Department of Geography & Planning at SUNY Buffalo State. The objective is to empower college students with interests in the environment, planning, sociology, economics, and law, among other disciplines, to brainstorm ways that WNY can address local climate change issues. Instructors of college courses are invited to incorporate this initiative within an existing course or to organize a student team, involving either a student club or a team organized specifically for the Research-A-Thon to tackle a specific question of their choosing from questions developed by local community groups or institutions. The involvement can be any length of time – working through an entire semester, a class assignment, or a one-day activity. The goal is to launch during the Fall 2020 and Spring 2021 semesters to accommodate scheduled courses. The outcomes of the Research-A-Thon – student products – will be presented on a web site. The web site will also include an edited summary of each effort. We anticipate presenting the student findings to the WNY community. Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

The City has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the “Scrap it” program with six summer locations available for drop-off. A regional, independent organization and chapter affiliate of the National Audubon Society, Buffalo Audubon currently stewards over seven preserves including 1,000 acres of land throughout Western New York. Its headquarters are located at Beaver Meadow Audubon Center in Wyoming County.

Why did the Frog Cross the Road?

Be on the lookout for amphibians crossing the road. With the arrival of spring temperatures, [amphibians](#) have begun their annual migrations to woodland pools to breed. In New York, this migration usually occurs on rainy nights in late March and early April, when the night air temperature is above 40F. When these conditions exist there can be explosive, "big night" migrations, with hundreds of amphibians on the move. [Volunteers can help document these locations and help amphibians](#) like wood frogs, spotted salamanders, American toads, or spring peepers safely cross the road. Drivers on New York roads are encouraged to proceed with caution or avoid travel on the first warm, rainy evenings of the season. Amphibians come out after nightfall and are slow moving; mortality can be high even on low-traffic roads.

Solar-Powered Heritage Carousel Opening Planned for 2020

A solar-powered historic carousel is planned for Canalside in 2020. The Buffalo Heritage Carousel, Inc. is currently restoring the 1924 Spillman carousel which features 34 hand carved and painted animals and 3 chariots, with most currently needing restoration. No More Flat Tires

Goodyear introduced its latest “stretch concept” tire, the ReCharge, which theoretically never needs replacing or even rotating because it can replace worn treads from the inside. ReCharge tires extrude a high-tech compound of renewable materials including dandelion rubber and synthetic spider silk. The mixture is fed through a series of fine pipes out to the surface of the wheel where they dry, cure and set into brand new treads. These are a more environmentally responsible alternative to today’s standard tire composition, which requires the addition of either carbon black or silica to reinforce the structural capabilities of petroleum rubber. In this case, the synthetic spider silk can help augment the natural properties of dandelion rubber to reduce wear and extend the functional life of the tire. Instead of relying on air pressure, the replacement tread solution would be stored in replaceable canisters within the wheel hub. [More info](#).

Report *Cladophora* on Shorelines

Help us understand and monitor *Cladophora*, a non-harmful green alga, by reporting observations along Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, Niagara River and St. Lawrence River Shorelines. *Cladophora* is a type of stringy (filamentous) algae that grows on rocks, wood, logs, and other hard underwater surfaces in freshwater ecosystems, including the Great Lakes basin. Brush Burning Not Allowed

DEC reminds residents that **residential brush burning is prohibited March 16 through May 14** across New York State. DEC posts a [fire danger rating map](#) and forecast daily during fire season on its website and on the NY Fishing, Hunting & Wildlife App available on DEC's website. Violators of the state's open burning regulation are subject to both criminal and civil enforcement actions, with a minimum fine of \$500 for a first offense. Business Membership Program to Encourage Greener Commuting

Go Buffalo Niagara, a Transportation Management Association serving Erie and Niagara Counties, has launched a [business membership program](#) which encourages people to commute without a car. Once a business is signed up, its employees who choose to walk, carpool, bike, or take public transit to work will have access to myriad alternative transportation incentives, such as: discounted transit passes and preferred parking for carpools, guaranteed ride home which provides those who don't drive alone with a free ride home in case of emergencies, discounted memberships to [GObike Buffalo](#) and [Reddy Bikeshare](#) and monthly raffles for commuters who log their commute trips.

Municipality Rebates for Zero-emission Vehicles and Grants for ZEV Infrastructure

The 2019 round of DEC's municipal ZEV program is now open. Full details may be found in the Request for Applications (RFA) at <http://www.dec.ny.gov/energy/109181.html>. A total of \$500,000 will be distributed in this round on a first-come, first-served basis for clean vehicle rebates which include plug-in hybrid, all-electric, and hydrogen fuel cell vehicles. Applications for the Municipal Clean Vehicle Rebate Program on a rolling basis through 4:00 pm on July 24, 2020 or until funding is exhausted. A total of \$2,500,000 in grants will be distributed for infrastructure to municipalities that installed (or will install) hydrogen filling station components or electric vehicle supply equipment (EVSE) that is Level 2 or direct current fast charge (DCFC). DEC is accepting applications for the Municipal ZEV Infrastructure Grant Program on a rolling basis through 4:00 pm on **May 29, 2020** or until funding is exhausted, whichever occurs first.

EPA's Excess Food Opportunities Map, first released in 2018, identifies and displays facility-specific information for over one million potential generators and recipients of excess food in the industrial, commercial and institutional sectors and also provides estimates of excess food for each generator. The map can be used to inform waste management and food recovery decisions at the local level as well as to identify potential sources of organic feedstocks, infrastructure gaps and alternatives to landfilling. The map may help businesses and organizations identify opportunities for new partnerships to help address changes in the food supply chain. For example, the map could be used to find potential food service or educational institution partners that may have available kitchens that could be used to store or preserve excess food or transform it into prepared meals, or to find businesses, such as caterers, that may have available refrigerated trucks to help transport excess food for food banks. EPA will continue to update the map so that it is a useful resource allowing businesses, organizations, and governments to make connections and find opportunities to make the best use of their excess food. To this end, the Public Gardens as Sentinels against Invasive Plants working group has developed recommended guidelines to help gardens organize and share their data from their collections to characterize when plants escape from cultivation. PGSIP has also developed a database for gardens to upload and access information about plants spreading from cultivation. By collecting data from gardens across North America, PGSIP hopes to be able to provide a clear picture about plants escaping cultivation and potentially becoming problematic before large-scale invasions occur and before commercial adoption of these taxa into the broader horticulture industry.
