Garlic Mustard Challenge Competition

Registration is now open for the Garlic Mustard Challenge, a friendly competition to reduce a harmful, invasive plant in Western New York. Civic organizations, scout groups, and families are encouraged to compete in the Challenge, which kicks off **April 13, 2013** at each site with training for volunteers in identifying and removing garlic mustard. After the kickoff event, groups can visit their preserve as often as they desire to collect garlic mustard until the competition ends on June 21, 2013. The teams that pull the most garlic mustard at each site will win \$200 and an overnight stay at Beaver Meadow's cabin in the woods. The runner-up at each site will receive \$50. The nature preserve that harnesses the most volunteer power will be crowned “Challenge Champion.”

Volunteers can sign up to remove garlic mustard at four locations: Buffalo Audubon's Beaver Meadow Nature Center in North Java (Wyoming County), New York State Department of Environmental Conservation's Reinstein Woods Nature Preserve in Cheektowaga (Erie County), Western New York Land Conservancy's Kenneglenn Preserve in Wales (Erie County) and The Lewiston Plateau Habitat Area in Lewiston (Niagara County). Attendance at the April 13 event is not mandatory, but groups interested in participating at any of the four sites must register by calling Reinstein Woods at 683-5959. Public Comment Period on Proposed Environmental Audit Incentives Policy

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is seeking public comment on a proposed commissioner policy entitled, "Environmental Audit Incentive Policy". The policy encourages regulated entities to audit their operations and adopt effective approaches to prevent violations, including environmental management systems and pollution prevention, thereby improving compliance with environmental laws statewide and protecting public health and the environment. To support these actions, this Policy reduces or waives penalties for violations that are discovered and disclosed voluntarily, or discovered during pollution prevention or compliance assistance and encourages regulated entities to engage, during the ordinary course of business, in an environmental audit program. This Policy also identifies incentives for regulated entities to go "beyond compliance" by agreeing to evaluate and incorporate environmental management and pollution prevention into their systems. NYS Grants Protect Watersheds by Improving Agricultural Operations

The Erie County Soil and Water Conservation District has been awarded two New York State Agricultural Non-point Source Abatement and Control Program Grants to help protect the quality of Erie County's water resources. Grants will assist farmers in implementing programs to protect lakes, streams, and rivers from potential agricultural runoff. One grant will assist agricultural operations in the Tonawanda Creek watershed in the Towns of Alden, Amherst, Clarence and Newstead. The seven landowners involved in this program will implement twenty-six agricultural best management practices ("BMPs") on their farms. Each participant will also install riparian (streamside) buffer areas along creeks and streams; these buffers will protect water quality by providing a strip of vegetation to filter out sediment and pollution in stormwater runoff, reduce erosion, and, with fencing, exclude livestock from creeks and streams. The grant provides \$352,485 in funding, with participating landowners required to match a percentage. The second grant will assist agricultural operations in the Eighteenmile Creek Watershed in the Towns of Boston, Eden, Concord, and North Collins. The seven landowners involved in this grant will implement seventeen BMPs on their farms, including milking center wastewater treatment, wastewater diversion, barnyard runoff management, and fencing to exclude animal traffic from waterways. Four farms will also install manure storage systems and components to allow for better utilization of nutrients and organic matter according to a Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plan ("CNMP"). This Plan specifies manure application guidelines for the farm based on soil character/condition, crop nutrient needs, and other factors. This grant provides \$815,150 in state cost-share funding. Want a beautiful yard using organic practices without conventional pesticides and synthetic fertilizers, but need help to create and maintain it? Businesses that participate in DEC's Be Green Organic Yards NY program can take care of your lawn, plants, and trees organically. When you hire a Be Green business, only products and materials that meet DEC's conditions for organic management should be used in your yard. Be Green businesses sign an agreement with DEC for the right to use the Be Green service mark (logo). 25C Tax Credit Extension for Homeowners

Tax credits to a home owner for an incremental energy efficiency improvement in the home (windows, insulation, etc.) were revived in a package of energy tax extenders in the "American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012". This 25C tax credit - which is capped at 10% of the product cost and a \$500 lifetime limit - is now extended through the end of 2013, and it has been made retroactive to include products installed in 2012. To claim the credit, homeowners need to enter the appropriate information about cost and measures installed when they file their tax return. [Learn more.](#)

Finnish Scientists Develop Biodegradable Diapers

Disposal diapers have traditionally been made with biologically non-degradable raw materials, such as polyester, so they remain indefinitely in the landfill. In a new process developed by VTT, biodegradable nonwovens diapers (disposable) feature the reuse of cardboard, which is more cost-effective to use as a raw material than paper. The biggest hurdle to reusing cardboard as a raw material for nonwovens is making sure it is clear of lignin and hemicellulose. VTT uses a patented technology to dissolve the pulp, which is safer and more environmentally friendly than the traditional viscose process. [Info](#).

Solar Energy Possible with Less Land than Expected

Renewable energy requires land, but a recent analysis by the World Wildlife Fund and other groups has shown that it is possible to meet current global energy needs with renewable energy without using too much land. The report, *Solar PV Atlas: solar power in harmony with nature*, shows through seven cases- six countries and one region- less than 1% of the total land mass would be required to meet 100% of projected electricity demand in 2050, if generating electricity only with solar PV. Tonawanda Health Study

The New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) conducted a health outcomes review for Tonawanda and surrounding areas in Erie County in response to community concerns about potential health effects from exposures to emissions from the area's industries and motor vehicle traffic. Working with community members and NYSDEC, NYSDOH developed a Tonawanda health outcomes study area, with several sub-areas, during 2010 - 2012. Rates of health outcomes in the Tonawanda study area were compared to the rates for people in NYS, excluding New York City (NYC), and also to rates for people in Erie and Niagara Counties. Total cancers as well as 18 separate types of cancer for women and 16 types for men were reviewed. In the overall study area, using NYS, excluding NYC, as the comparison, lung cancer, bladder cancer, and total cancers were elevated among both males and females; esophageal cancer was elevated among males and uterine cancer was elevated among females.
