To address the need for training in alternatives to conventional pesticides, the DEC is offering a workshop on **October 8** from 8:30am-4:30pm at Tiff Nature Preserve. This free entry-level training course will teach you the fundamentals of organic land care and pest control using alternatives to conventional pesticides, including soil enrichment, seed selection, horticultural practices and other non-chemical pest and disease management techniques, as well as the use of pesticides allowed under NYS law. COLLECTED enables higher education institutions to exchange e-waste for cash or rewards, while preventing millions of pounds of harmful waste from reaching landfills. COLLECTED pays higher education institutions for collecting used inkjet and toner printer cartridges, cell phones, MP3 players, digital cameras and laptops. Buffalo Zoo Conservation Efforts for Indian Rhinos

Buffalo Zoo’s Indian rhinoceros, Tashi, is pregnant. The Zoo participated in an experimental artificial insemination (AI) procedure, and is one of the first zoos in the world to have a successful Indian rhino AI pregnancy. A team from the Buffalo Zoo worked with Dr. Monica Stoops from the Center of Conservation and Research of Endangered Wildlife (CREW) based at the Cincinnati Zoo to help with the AI process. The procedure took place in February of 2013. If Tashi remains healthy and the pregnancy successfully goes to term, keepers expect that she will give birth in June of 2014. The pregnancy is an important step towards global rhino conservation, and is already proving invaluable to the research efforts of CREW and the rhinoceros species survival plan (SSP.)

Climate Change Data

LMI-CliCkE is an online database to explore, analyze, evaluate, and compare nearly 3,000 scientific findings related to climate change drawn from the Fourth Assessment Report (AR4) of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). Users can search and filter climate change findings based on various criteria including: topic, source, geographic region, time period, and level of uncertainty. Sustainability in Design: Backpack Filters Water and Powers Electronics

An excellent design example for a new product that addresses societal need, the First Few Days is a backpack that can be used to filter water for drinking and a hand-held pump generates electricity to power small devices. It is intended for victims of natural disasters as well as rescue workers, volunteers and even the military. A tube with a float is placed in a water source, and a lever on the outside of the pack is pumped to move water through an activated carbon filter. Water is stored in external bottles and filled via a port on the outside of the pack. The pump action of the lever generates electricity with the help of a dynamo, which is stored in a lithium ion battery and used to charge small devices, like phones or radios, via a USB port. Climate Change Public Service Videos

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) today released a new series of short public service videos on climate change. The [videos](#) cover a range of topics related to climate change, including its causes and impacts, actions Americans can take to reduce their impact, and the benefits to the economy of addressing climate change. The new video series supports the President’s Climate Action Plan by encouraging American families to reduce the amount of energy they consume, cutting down on their utility bills and protecting people’s health.

Biobulb Seeks Funding

Increasing attention to biological systems and their operations has drawn designers to study phenomena like bioluminescence—the emission of light by living organisms. A team of students from the University of Wisconsin-Madison has proposed to integrate it into a common industrial object. The student finalists in [#CrowdGrant Challenge](#) have proposed the commercialization of [Biobulb](#)—a microbe-powered lightbulb. The technology utilizes *Escherichia coli* bacteria that are genetically engineered to bioluminesce. The organisms will derive energy from growth media, and use ambient light to make their own food. The bulb life is uncertain, but may last several months with repeated recharging via light. Donations of \$100 earn a starter kit to make a Biobulb at home. [Info](#)

Glean NY Accepting Tax Deductible Food Donations

Fruit and vegetable growers with good food that doesn't have a market are encouraged to donate produce to food banks throughout the state under an initiative, "Glean NY." The Glean NY project hopes to increase the donation of nutritious fresh food that might not otherwise be harvested due to weather damage, crops fruiting at unusual times, irregular sizes, cosmetic damage, or other reasons. Donated produce does not have to be washed or graded. In some instances, food banks can supply field crates, and pickup food at the farm. Food banks own refrigerated trucks and can arrange pickup of donations within a day or two of receiving a call. Advanced Bird-Friendly Wildlife Habitats

Do you want to have a bird-friendly habitat? Besides using bird feeders with store-bought seeds, you can use some of the tips below to offer them a welcoming environment. Plant Natural Feeders-Birds use feeders to supplement the natural foods they find in the landscape. By planting shrubs, trees and other plants, you'll feed birds with seeds, berries, nuts, sap and nectar as well as shelter and nesting places. Once planted, they'll provide free bird food for years to come. Even if you can't provide food, a simple bird bath with clean water will attract plenty of birds to your yard. Replace the water every three days to keep the bath clean and to avoid mosquito problems. Make your own suet by recycling bacon grease. Next time you fry up a batch of bacon, pour the grease into a plastic container and freeze it. You can then put it out in a suet cage or mesh onion bags as a high calorie treat for birds such as woodpeckers, jays and chickadees. Grow Your Own Feeders - Plant sunflowers instead of buying sunflower seed. The flowers look beautiful and also provide nectar for bees and other beneficial insects. - 1. Dry out your latex paint for disposal-** dried latex paint is not a hazard. If you have a little paint at the bottom of the can, allow it to dry and then you can toss it in household trash. Consider donating cans with usable quantities to schools, theatre groups and others who may need smaller amounts for projects. [More info here.](#)
- 2. Check out the Materials Exchange for industry-related goods-** Mat Ex is a web-based listing of materials that companies have in surplus (packing materials, containers etc.). Check it out if you need a source for some items or if you can make these available rather than sending to the landfill-sometimes free, but cheaper than buying new. Although Erie County isn't listed among the counties on the website, many of the listing companies are located in Buffalo. Check out the tips at <http://www.recycle.net/matex/>.
- 3. Plant pots can be recycled locally-**just a reminder as you complete your fall cleanup, several local nurseries (see list below under recycling locations) will take plastic pots, cleanse them and reuse. Tell your neighbors-there is no need for soil and pots to go to the landfill.
